


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Jokers Lane alias Gravel Wood Lane.

The site of Gibcracks Manor House, - otherwise Henpicked Hall.

Part of the property that was the Hospital Homes of St. Giles, started in 1914 as a nursing home for leprosy sufferers, but closed in 1984 as the last leprosy hospital in England. The complex is now run by the Springboard Housing Association a charity who provides sheltered housing mainly in Essex and East London.

Moor Farm; dates back to 1469 when it was called 'Morefeldes', was changed a little by 1527 to 'Morelande Hall, the origin of the name probably comes from the Old English for 'morning-gift', a gift given the morning after marriage by the husband to his wife.

Bicknacre Priory; This Priory was at first a Hermitage, before 1156, it became a Priory for Augustinian Canons and was named Woodham Abbey, it was dedicated to St. John the Baptist. The building of the Priory was at first funded by King Henry II, who then directed Maurice fitz-Geoffrey to attend the remainder from the large amount he owed the Crown. Activity at the Priory slowly came to a halt with the death of the last Prior in 1507, the Priory stood empty for a while until it was united with the Hospital of St. Mary, London, until the Dissolution drove them out in 1537. The property was then sold off into private hands and turned into a farm.

The site of 'The Three Compasses' P.H. in the 1840's the Pub was run by John Hazell, the owner, Mary Shuttleworth, also had other property, part of which was known as 'Little Bicknacre Common'.

Soon after the old 'Three Compasses' closed, another opened on this site called 'The New Compasses Inn'.

'The White Swan', beer has been sold from this site since 1834.

Start and Finish, at Priory Corner Garage car park.


Priory Lane, One of the four lanes that lead to the mill.


The Site of Bicknacre Mill, a postmill and local land mark for about 300 years, closed in 1911 after being damaged in a storm.


'The Brewers Arms', first appears as Samwell Cooch's Copyhold called 'Tile Pit Hall', started selling beers in the 1870's.

'The Star', little known of this beerhouse and hostelry situated beside the old drovers road to Maldon, except in the later years they sold 'Crabb Beers',

All that remains of Bicknacre Common, otherwise known as the "Hooe" of which it was once written; "A Description of ye Common called ye Hooe in Woodham Ferris in the County of Essex Reputed in Ancient Surveys to be one hundred Acres which true Admeasurement in the yeare of our Lord God 1693 was found to be 99acres 3Roods & 30 perches by John Coffyn"

'Charity Farm'

In 1716 Edmund Butler vested in trust an estate of 193 acres to provide for the education and clothing of the poor children of the parishes of Boreham and Little Baddow.

'Nuttings'

This new house stands on part of what once was Nuttings Farm, a part of Lord Rayleigh's estates along with Birkett's Hall.

'Hollands Farm'

Possibly a corruption of an old farm name of 'Howlands', which dates back to 1538.

St. Mary's Church, .

Built on the site of a

Saxon church in the 13th century,
extended in the 14th & 15th centuries.

The tower that once adorned the West end of
the Church fell in 1703, was rebuilt only to
fall again in 1774, and was replaced by a
wooden belfry to house one of the former five
bells.

'Edwins Hall'

Rebuilt by Edwin Sandys, Archbishop of York, from whom it takes its name.

The house today is but a small portion of the double moated Manor House which was built between 1576 and 1580.


'Edwards Manor'


One of the smaller Manors of
Woodham Ferrers, held by William
deWoodham in 1271, remained in the
family for well over 100 years. Later
the Manor was in the possession of the
Sandys family, who also held the
property for over 100 years.

The footpath used today is the same path that was used by the staff at the Hall, the shortest route to town and Church.

'The Bell'

The present Public House was built in 1885, on a site that has had brewing connections as far back at least as 1623.
